6 Facts About School Attendance

- 1. Did you know that the absenteeism in the first month of school can predict poor attendance throughout the school year. Half the students who miss 2 4 days in September go on to miss nearly a month of school.
- 2. Building good habits in school attendance starts early. Absenteeism and its ill effects start early. That is why it is so important to make sure your child(ren) attend each and every day of school. We want all of our students to be the best they can be in all aspects and attendance is key.
- 3. Poor attendance can influence whether children are able to read grade level materials. This causes challenges for children in the areas of self esteem and academic achievement. We want our students to have even advantage possible and do not want our students to struggle.
- 4. Did you know that missing 10% of school year, which is about 18 days, negatively affects a student's academic performance. That's just two days a month and that's known as chronic absenteeism.
- 5. Research shows that chronic absenteeism becomes a leading indicator that a student will drop out of high school. We want all students to be able to complete high school as we know all Exshaw students are capable of it! We just need students to be here each day.
- 6. When students improve their attendance rates, they improve their academic prospects and chances for graduation. All of our staff wants to celebrate the graduation of all students that have attended Exshaw School.

Exshaw School Loves to Read!

Here are some tips for home reading with your child(ren)!

- Have a home reading routine. Read aloud with your child(ren) everyday. Ten
 minutes for each child around a book of their choice. Talk about the pictures and
 share where you can. Share your excitement for reading and this will be the
 model your child will adopt.
- The reader holds the book! There is a lot of power and control in the world of reading. The reader needs to have the power.
- During home reading time, turn off electronic devices and give each child ten minutes of your undivided attention.
- Before you read a book, set your child up for success. Reading is not a test! Reading time is only ten minutes so do some of the following: Keep the introduction short - one minute is enough. Talk about the pictures and the title. Talk about the author, talk about any unusual words, read a page here and there as your child flicks through the book and discuss the characters. This is a short introduction and should be fun! If the book is already a familiar one, then this step is unnecessary.
- If reading time is stressful, move the reading to a new location. Instead of sitting at the kitchen table, move to family room, or go outside or take the books to a favourite place to read.
- Find a reading time that works for your family. Limit the time and set the timer if reading in the past has always been difficult. It is better to have an enjoyable ten minutes than a difficult thirty minutes where everyone is left feeling frustrated.
- At the end of the ten minutes, ask questions that encourage discussion, for example: What was your favourite part? Tell me about the characters. What do you think will happen next? What did you think about that setting? What do you like/dislike about this book? Make it a comfortable conversation.
- Encourage your child(ren) to read independently. A bedside light is one of best items for your child(ren) to have to encourage reading before going to sleep. After the ten minutes of reading with you, the child can continue reading independently.
- The less you interrupt the ten minutes of reading, the more you are supporting the readers independence, resilience and confidence. Just enjoy listening to your child(ren) read.
- Enjoy your child(ren) as they are reading. Celebrate them by saying things about the strategies they are using while reading such as: "I like how you read on when you came to that difficult word." "I I like how you changed your voice to be the voice of the character in the story." "I noticed that you reread the bit that did not make sense."
- Model what it means to be an enthusiastic reader. Create a home of readers
 where everyone reads It is just what we do in this house! Talk about what you
 have read. Read aloud what makes you laugh and share it with your child(ren).

Learning Needs

Did you know that all of our staff are designing learning activities to ensure that they are addressing the learning needs of each individual student's needs in the class? Our wonderful teachers and educational assistants, identify exact needs and design activities that are motivating and fun to help students reach their highest potential. Our staff is using every moment to support students in the best way possible to improve literacy and numeracy challenges.

Cultural Learning

Did you know we embed cultural learning opportunities that link to our learning outcomes for students at Exshaw School? We had the opportunity to do the scraping of hides with our students in grades 7/8 and 8, alongside Knowledge Keeper, Daryl Kootenay? As well, our next step is tanning of the hides with Elders, Phillomene and Tracey Stevens. We believe in honouring the whole child. Learning experiences such as these nurture the physical, cognitive, emotional, social and spiritual development of students. In turn, this supports the development of a child who is healthy, knowledgeable, motivated and engaged.
